Warriors earn commanding first-round playoff victory

Eminence earned its first postseason win since 2020 with a 42-0 victory over Nicholas County at home on Friday, Nov. 8.

The Warriors executed their game plan on both sides of the ball and limited the Blue Jackets' run game throughout the evening to claim a spot in the second round of the Class 1A playoffs.

"It feels good. It was one of the goals we had to start the

year. It's one of the thing we talked about moving the program forward and getting a chance to win a shot at the district and then the next goal was to win a first round playoff game," said head coach Ryan Jones. "To be able to do that when it's been a goal all year and something we talked about all offseason, it feels really good. I'm happy

for the guys, especially the seniors."

Eminence kicked off the game with a strong defensive stand, slowing Nicholas County on the ground with multiple key stops at the end of the

Blue Jackets' opening drive. "Coach (Mount) Hadden does a great job of having the guys prepared with their game plan each week and making sure that the defensive guys know what's going on in our checks and where their keys are. So the big thing was we came out tonight and were ready to play from the first play all night," said Jones. "We've talked about it for a couple years but it showed up tonight and that was big because if they get a score and get up on you, with an offense like that, it puts you in a hole and it's really hard to get the ball back."

Landon Smither came up with a pair of tackles to force a punt before earning a 61-yard reception on the first play of the Warriors' ensuing possession.
